bedtime is noisy.

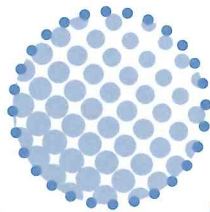
rabbits are great fun.

Notes for parents

Help your child to read the instructions, supporting your child in using phonic skills to decode the words. When you are confident that your child understands the activity, ask them to rewrite Daisy's sentences correctly.



Full stops

Cathy the cat has forgotten to put a full stop at the end of each sentence. Can you help her to write the sentences correctly?



I do not like dogs

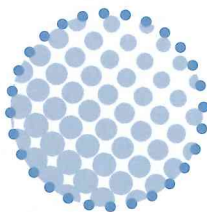
Dogs cannot climb trees

I am safe up a tree

Write a sentence about Cathy the cat. Remember to start with a capital letter and finish with a full stop.

Now try this!

Look at a page of your reading book. How many full stops can you find?



Notes for parents

Help your child to read the instructions. Remind him or her that sentences usually have a full stop at the end, though you may wish to point out that some sentences have exclamation marks and some have question marks. Read through the activity, supporting your child in using their phonic skills to decode the words. Check that they remember to use a capital letter at the start of each sentence!
