Bicton C E Primary School and Nursery P.E. and Sport Premium Funding 2020-2021 Expenditure and Impact



In 2020/21 we received £17,106 and carried forward £7,130 to 2021/22.

The governments' PE and Sport Premium funding has been allocated to ensure that P.E. and sport are at the heart of school life to raise achievement for all young people. This will cover aspects such as the teaching of P.E. and encouraging healthy and active lifestyles and will ensure that children have access to competitive school sport. The areas identified for spending in 2020/2021 will ensure that the funding raises achievement and increases the participation of children across our school.

Desired outcomes / key indicators

Opportunities will be provided that engage all pupils in regular physical activity to encourage positive attitudes towards healthy and active lifestyles.

Pupils' leadership roles will be developed to support sport / physical activity within school, including involvement in playground provision to further increase active play.

Broader experience of a range of sports and activities will be offered to all pupils to enable them to explore new sporting activities and choices for a healthy lifestyle.

Profile of PE and sport will be raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement. Pupils will develop skills for life and will show increased self-esteem. Increased team work and resilience will enhance learning across the curriculum.

Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport, to support them in teaching P.E. and sport more effectively, resulting in improved lesson outcomes and progress in P.E.

Increased participation rates in children attending after-school sport clubs and entering competitions.

£854 After-school clubs	The number of school staff delivering after-school sporting activities has been increased this year. This has shown increase pupil participation in some year groups, through providing positive role models and leading by example to encourage an active and healthy lifestyle. Our Forest School site is used regularly for extra-curricular (as well as curricular) provision. Although the number of pupils attending weekly after-school sporting clubs was less overall during 2020-2021 than in previous years (due to COVID-19), numbers increased once all children returned to school in March 2021.	Football and netball clubs, each run by 2 different members of staff, will be introduced in the autumn term 2021. This will include participation in inter-school competitions to sustain opportunities for competitive team sports. £12,718 PE and School Sport apprentice	Employing a School Sport apprentice has provided a positive role model to pupils and encouraged more pupils to want to take up sport outside of school e.g. a number of pupils have taken up rugby outside school. Staff member has planned, delivered and evaluated PE lessons and after-school sports clubs, as well as coordinating and delivering lunchtime activities to raise activity levels and increase participation in physical activity. This was a key priority for this year as, when pupils returned to school in September 2020, we identified that some pupils had been less active during the first national lockdown.	After completing their 2-year apprenticeship, the member of staff has taken up a full-time position with the School. In their new role, they will continue to monitor pupil participation, as evidence towards attaining the School Games Mark, as well as coach young leaders to develop their skills and independence in leading these activities. Our aim is to encourage pupils to take on leadership and volunteering roles outside school, which support sport and physical activity, to prepare them for opportunities in KS3 and beyond.
